In this well-timed book Petter Gottschalk and Hans Solli-Sæther present popular e-government interoperability practices. They use several organization and management theories as a means of understanding the underlying factors of interoperability. Improved interoperability at all levels of public sector and between public and private sector is of critical importance to make electronic government more successful. The authors bring together their expertise as academics and researchers, along with their professional experience as Chief Information Officers of several organizations.

This book covers a range of important topics such as barriers of interoperability and solutions to overcome them, value configuration for interoperability, alignment of information resources to government tasks, defining stages of E-Government interoperability, strategic planning for alignment of E-Government initiatives. Interoperability represents an import issue for all governments, yet not many executives are quite clear about the various aspects of interoperability and therefore run the risk of missing opportunities in integration projects.
