Rapid advancement of technology has transformed the information environment entirely. The penetration of digital technologies has made it easier for both information professionals and library users. Users prefer and thrive in a digitized environment. Digital platforms and digital devices have become central to all types of twenty-first century libraries and information centers. Social media platforms and different digital devices, such as, tablets, self-service scanners, digital signage, digital lockers, MakerSpace, 3D printers and 3D scanners, cloud computing are used in libraries to optimize library services in the Digital Milieu. Hence, libraries spend huge amount of budgets to acquisitions of digital devices and e-resources.

This book titled *Handbook of Research on Digital Devices for Inclusivity and Engagement in Libraries* explores the use and benefits of digital devices in several ways focusing on inclusivity and engagement in libraries, such as, use of social media by medical librarians for inclusive engagement; use of digital devices for marketing library products; use of artificial intelligence; cloud librarianship and infopreneurship initiatives for inclusiveness; resource sharing; learning management and library collection enhancement. Afolayan et al from Nigeria examine Artificial intelligence, cloud librarianship and infopreneurship initiatives for inclusiveness.

Tella, Adeyinka, Femi Quardri, Bamidele, Sunday Segun, and Ajiboye, Olubukola Oluyemisi from Nigeria embark on resource sharing vehicle for effective library information dissemination and services in the digital age, while Abdulmumin Isah from University of Ilorin, Nigeria examine the use of social media as tools for information sharing among undergraduates of university of Ilorin.

Several authors have explored use of cloud computing, for example, M.T. Bashorun, and K.T. Omopupa from the University of Ilorin, Nigeria, GarbaDahiru, Abubakar Tafawa Balewa University (ATBU), Bauchi, Nigeria examine cloud computing and academic libraries in Nigeria, while Olaronke O. Fagbola, University of Ilorin, Nigeria, Ambrose Smart, National Open University of Nigeria, Abuja, Nigeria, Babarotimi Opeyemi Oluwaseun, National Open University of Nigeria, Abuja, Nigeria assess the application of Cloud Computing Technologies in Academic Library Management at the National Open University of Nigeria Library in Perspective.

Michelle Kowalsky, from Rowan University, USA shares his School Librarian's experiences of Learning Management Implementation. Adebayo Muritala Adegboire from the University of Ibadan examines the use of Digital Storytelling, Podcasting and New Format of Messaging in the Libraries. Victoria Okojie, University of Abuja, Faith Orim, University of Calabar, Oluwatoyin Oso, Ajayi Crowther University, and Adeyinka Tella, University of Ilorin, Nigeria identify the Opportunities and challenges of e-book readers and mobile devices in libraries based on experiences from Nigeria.

Edeama O. Onwuchekwa from the United State of America Library deliberate on signage and Information Graphics as a communication tool for library users. Kayode Wale, Adewuyi, Faith Academy Ilorin, Kwara State from Nigeria discuss the new tools, gadgets and devices in libraries. Ayodele Alonge from University of Ibadan explores the Markerspace as motivating, engaging spaces in libraries and information centers.

Halimah Odunayo. Amuda, AlHikma Univrsity, Ilorin, Imelda Barong Edam-agbor University of Calabar, and Muhammed Jamiyu Oladele, University of Ilorin, Nigeria investigate open access, open contents and collections as new opportunities in libraries. Yusus Ayodeji Ajani, Tella, Adeyinka and Shola Temitope Famuyiwa from University of Ilorin debate on the print versus digital publishing answer what should be the focus, contents or platform?
